Thanks to all who made AEF deployment a huge success

I recently reread some previous articles from the Sandy Hog Gazette, and found some common themes. The first and most obvious is that we have the finest people in the Air National Guard working right here in the 111th Fighter Wing. The second is that we have great attitudes, work hard to overcome obstacles, and turn in impressive results regularly. I am fortunate enough to see all of this first hand, especially when we deploy.

It is not solely because we have bright, talented, motivated people who take pride in their work, but because these people see wing members as family members. We see it every year around this time as Christmas gets closer and we join in celebration. And with the approach of the New Year we celebrate the successes of the past year and look for ways to improve next year. There is much to celebrate from 2007. It was one of the most fast-paced, hectic years I've seen, with the objective being direct support for the Soldiers, Sailors, Marines and Airmen fighting the war in Iraq. Several people did a great job helping us "pitch into the fight" at an important time. For those who worked hard in the preparations, your efforts were obvious and paid huge dividends.

For those who deployed, you saw some of the most interesting living and working conditions anyone in the current military has seen. From 120+ degree temperatures to massive sandstorms to unfathomable demands, you kept the airplanes flying 24/7 for more than 60 consecutive days and nights, and then got our people and equipment redeployed with very little support.

For those who supported the fight from home station, your contributions are greater than you may know. For our families, your efforts are in many cases the greatest of all.

We enjoy these successes because we focused our energy on the AEF knowing it would require a Herculean effort to get the jets modified, the maintainers trained, pilots qualified & ready for combat, and then get all the people and equipment in place. Just because a pilot or maintainer has a certain qualification, doesn't necessarily mean that person is ready for combat ops. As with any new system, it takes some time before it becomes second nature when using it or maintaining it. As challenging as it was, it was again the people of this wing working hard to make it all come together. And for those who put forth these Herculean efforts, staved focused and accomplished the mission with dignity, I offer my heartiest, most sincere thanks.

Let's look at some of the numbers from the AEF to put this performance into perspective. The first set of numbers reflect our AEF accomplishments and the numbers in parentheses approximate typical home station flying operations.

Hours Flown: 2500+	(3600/year)		
Sorties Flown: 625+	(2000/year)		
Avg Sortie Duration:	4.0	(1.8)	
Avg Time on Station:	3.0	(0)	
Hours on Station:	1875+	(0)	
Avg Fleet Time:	250	(170)	
Avg # Days in Phase:	5	(20)	

So to further explain this, in 60 days we flew about two-thirds of a typical year's flying hours, one-third of a typical year's number of sorties and spent about one-half of a full year's flying hours "on station" in nearly every region of Iraq. We employed more than a dozen laser guided bombs, 2,700 rounds of 30mm, a handful of illumination flares and a few pods of rockets. We escorted convoys, searched for and successfully discovered roadside Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs), covered night time raids, tracked and

destroyed multiple enemy targets to include weapons caches and moving vehicles. Some of our work was done without employing anything other than the Advanced Targeting Pod (ATP) linked to the Joint Terminal Air Controller (JTAC) on the ground, or by simply accomplishing a Show of Force at low altitude. These numbers are produced in large part by the truly phenomenal numbers for Average Fleet Time and Average number of days in Phase. An Average Fleet Time of 250 hours on a 400 hour timeline is simply unheard of, and when each jet gets to its Phase Inspection it typically takes about 20 working days to accomplish the inspection and make repairs. Our folks were completing these inspections in five days in tough working conditions. Granted, we ran 24 hour ops, but these numbers are incredible.

How did the 111th Expeditionary Maintenance Squadron (EMXS) and 103rd Expeditionary Fighter Squadron (EFS) accomplish all this? The answer is found in the second sentence of this article. If you want to see the complete list of names that make these great things happen, look at the personnel rosters for the Wing, Mission Support, Maintenance, Medical and Ops Groups. In our usual, outstanding manner we left a deployed location better than we found it. It was our people who built permanent structures to improve work conditions, created HazMat pro-See Command View on page 5

Sandy Run gives thanks to members of 111th

As a bonus, the country club gave each guardsman a birdie on three holes that are currently under reconstruction and are unplayable.

"We're starting them off at three under par," Creeden said.

The guardsmen were thankful, too, and to show their gratitude, they presented the country club with a flag that had flown in an A-10 Thunderbolt fighter plane.

"It makes it a lot easier for us to serve the state and the country," said Col. Tony Carrelli, an A-10 pilot who has flown in the Persian Gulf and Afghanistan. "We appreciate getting a welcome from the community."

Their morale could use some lifting.

The guardsmen's spirits have been

deflated since the federal government decided to pull the A-10s out of the Willow Grove Naval Air Station, said Steve Johnston, a munitions expert from Quakertown.

"Where are we supposed to go when the planes leave?" he said.

The cold and the dampness could not scare them off the links, and besides, hot coffee, lunch and a steaming sauna were waiting for them inside when they finished.



Fire department hosts hazardous materials certification course

The 111th Fire Department hosted an 80 hour Hazardous Materials Technician Certification course in September for 23 members of the wing and NAS JRB fire departments.

Master Sgt. Chris McCormick, 111th Fire Department hazardous materials trainer, conducted the course. McCormick is a member of the City of Philadelphia Fire Department hazardous materials response team.

Students were instructed how to identify hazardous materials and storage containers and stabilize hazardous materials incidents. They learned how to monitor and test for hazardous materials and how to select and use protective clothing. They also learned to use specialized tools when mitigating hazardous material releases.

Through classroom sessions and practical fieldwork, the course taught members how to function safely and effectively in an area exposed to hazardous materials. This certification gives our fire fighters the ability to operate offensively during hazardous materials incidents. All personnel and tools directly involved in a hazardous material incident must go through a decontamination process to either remove or neutralize contaminants (shown above).

National Personnel Records Center opens official military personnel files

The National Personnel Records Center (NPRC) will open for the first time all of the individual Official Military Personnel Files (OMPFs) of Army, Army Air Corps, Army Air Forces, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard military personnel who served and were discharged, retired or died while in the service, prior to 1946.

Collectively, these files comprise more than six million records. This is the second step in the progressive opening of entire paper and microfiche OMPF collection of over 57 million individual files. Additional military personnel records will be made available to the public each year through 2067 until the entire collection is opened.

These archived files are treasured by family members, historians, researchers, and genealogists. Contained in a typical OMPF are documents outlining all elements of military service, including assignments, evaluations, awards and decorations, education and training, demographic information, some medical information and documented disciplinary actions. Some records also contain photographs of the individual and official correspondence concerning military service.

To view an original record, individuals may visit the NPRC Archival Research Room in St. Louis, MO. Their telephone number is (314) 801-0850. Research room hours are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Central Time Tuesday through Friday. Visitors are strongly encouraged to call ahead to make reservations.

To obtain copies of records, customers may write to NPRC at 9700 Page Avenue, St. Louis, MO 63132, fax a request to 314-801-9195, or submit a request through **http://www.vetrecs. archives.gov** or on a Standard Form 180.

Information about records available at NPRC is also posted on the National Personnel Records Center Homepage at: <u>http://www.archives.gov/st-louis/</u> <u>military-personnel/index.html</u>

Archived, public records are subject to the National Archives and Records Administration's published fee schedule. Copy fees for archived OMPFs are waived for veterans or primary nextof-kin (surviving spouse or children of the veteran) if the records are needed to validate a benefit or entitlement.

The fee schedule for OMPFs is as follows:

OMPFs 5 pages or less: \$15 OMPFs 6 pages or more: \$50 (most OMPFs fall in this category)

OMPFs of Persons of Exceptional Prominence (PEP): \$.75 per page (PEP records include the OMPFs of famous individuals such as former Presidents, famous military leaders, decorated military heroes, celebrities, entertainers, and professional athletes who left military service and have been deceased for at least 10 years).

Archived records are subject to a limited privacy exemption under the provisions of the Freedom of Information Act. As such, all records are reviewed prior to release and social security numbers are redacted.
