I have full confidence in our ability to maintain this high level of professionalism through the end of flight ops here at Willow Grove, but want to stress the importance of maintaining our focus on safety and doing things right. Now is not the time to cut corners. We must maintain our high standards and diligence to the task at hand until the last jet departs and our flying mission is complete.

## Sexual Assault Response Program provides help for victims

Nearly 600 sexual assaults were reported throughout the Air Force in fiscal 2009, but the majority of men and women who experience a sexual assault, 78 percent and 79 percent respectively, choose not to report the incident, according to Department of Defense (DOD) officials.

There is no time span limiting the victim from reporting the sexual assault. It could have happened either two minutes or twenty years ago. Reporting is the critical first step to being offered the variety of resources available to people who have experienced sexual violence.

"Why so many people choose not to come forward vary. They may blame themselves or think others blame them for what happened. They may fear their career will be jeopardized because of their involvement in an investigation or that others may question their lifestyle and choices, but in order to prevent sexual assault, we have to know about it," said Major Christine Munch, 111th Fighter Wing Executive Officer.

Major Munch is the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC) and the focal point of contact for the Wing's Sexual Assault Response Program (SAPR), which means she is responsible for making sure a victim support system exists capable of responding to all reported sexual assaults, 24 hours a day, seven days a week, occurring on or off the installation.

According to the major, when someone comes forward to report an assault, it is the job of the SARC to provide clear, accurate information on reporting options available and ensure the safety and medical needs of a sexual assault victim are met and, unless the victim declines services, assign a victim advocate.

Considered the SARC's greatest asset, a victim advocate is a fully trained volunteer who provides one-on-one direct support to a victim. They assist victims through the initial response, investigation, legal and recovery processes. Although advocates don't provide clinical counseling or legal and investigative guidance, they do provide information on available options and resources enabling the victim to make an informed decision. The SARC ensures the victim advocates are from different squadrons on base and represent both males and females along the spectrum of rank.

"As a victim advocate, you would work closely with

partnering agencies in the community to assist victims through crisis intervention, legal advocacy, and follow-up care," explained Major Munch.

She added that victim advocates can refer a victim to different supporting agencies, such as the chapel, mental health, or a health care professional and are trained to assist family or significant others who are affected by their loved one's experience. They will continue to help the victim as long as their support is required.

"Because the advocates need to be available around the clock, it would make sense if he or she was an AGR, but it's not required. Anyone interested in becoming a victim advocate for us should contact me," urged the major. "Sexual assault is the most under reported crime in America today, and we have to continue to strive to ensure our members are aware that sexual assault is a crime and is not tolerated."

Sexual assault in all branches of the armed forces continues to be a problem. The DOD's fiscal year 2009 report on sexual assault in the military was released in March. It showed a total of 3,230 reports of sexual assault involving military service members, of these 546 involved Air Force members. Of those cases, 300 were unrestricted reports (the assault is reported up the chain; investigation ensues) involving an Airman as either the subject or victim. The remaining 246 cases were restricted reports (no report is made up the chain and no investigation is done) made by the victims.

Everyone from our senior leaders to our junior enlisted, as well as, civilian employees and dependents, are highly encouraged to remain on alert and become proactive who will report and prevent these types of unacceptable conduct and behavior at all times.

As Guardsmen, we have a responsibility to look out for each other. If you know someone who has been assaulted, it is your responsibility to encourage that individual to report it," said the major. "Preventing sexual assault is everyone's duty."

## Attention deployers

Please ensure you take care of the PHA, HIV, Immunization, and Ballistic Eyewear requirements on Saturday mornings of the UTA's. These must be scheduled through your Unit Health Monitor (UHM) by calling x1300/1462. HIVs must be drawn within 90 days of vour deployment so please pay particular attention to the NET (Not Earlier Than) date listed on the spreadsheet (if one is listed). If you require new gas mask inserts and/or prescription Ballistic eyewear, please bring a current eye glass prescription with you to your scheduled medical appointment. Once ordered, eyewear takes about two weeks to be received.

Additionally, all deployers must have a baseline ANAM test on file prior

to deploying. ANAM stands for Automated Neuropsychological Assessment Metric and is simply a 20 minute computerized test that assesses your general cognitive functioning that can be used as a baseline to detect mild traumatic brain injury if you receive a blow to the head in the future. For more information regarding the ANAM test, contact Tech. Sgt. Susan McDowell at (215) 443-1387. Testing is accomplished by appointment only and can be scheduled during the week or on Saturday or Sunday afternoons of the UTA.

To clarify, the ONLY requirement that can be accomplished during the week is ANAM testing. ALL other requirements must be SCHEDULED and accomplished over the UTA.

## Air Force officials announce uniform policy changes

RANDOLPH AIR FORCE BASE, Texas – Air Force officials announced April 12 uniform policy updates resulting from recent Air Force Uniform Board decisions.

The following policy modifications are effective immediately unless otherwise stated and will be incorporated into Air Force Instruction 36-2903, Air Force Uniform Dress and Appearance.

The tucking of trousers on utility uniforms into boots will remain optional. This reverses a mandatory tuck-in requirement previously announced by the 98th Air Force Virtual Uniform Board. When tucked in or bloused, the trouser must be even and draped loosely over the top of the combat boot to present a bloused appearance.

The green fleece watch cap is approved for wear with the all-purpose environmental clothing system, improved rain suit, cold weather parka, sage green fleece and the physical training uniform.

Air Force officials encourage all Airmen to affix name, rank and service designator tapes to

their sage green fleeces instead of waiting for the Oct. 1 mandatory wear date. However, officers wanting to wear a watch cap with the sage green fleece must now have their name, rank and service designator tapes affixed to the fleece effective immediately.

Other authorized cold weather items remain unchanged. They include the black or sage green leather, suede or knit gloves; black scarves that are tucked in; and black earmuffs.

Uniform officials remind Airmen that the sage green fleece can still be worn as a liner for the APECS without name, rank and service designator tapes. The black fleece will no longer be authorized for wear as an APECS liner on Oct. 1.

Air Force officials also modified the 97th AFUB decision that stated the women's A-line skirt would become the primary mess dress skirt for the Air Force. The change allows the side-slit mess dress skirt to continue to be worn as an optional item.
