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Wing support serves as an integral part of EMEDS mission

In August of 2009, the 111th Medical Group had the opportunity to set up one of our Expeditionary Medical Support (EMEDS) hospitals for training purposes at Willow Grove. Our medical personnel, along with Guard members from Pittsburgh and Newburgh, New York, were evaluated by an inspection team from Alpena, Michigan. As a result of this inspection, we received EMEDS certification. This event marked the first opportunity for our Medical Group members to acquire hands on training in preparation for our new ANG mission. This new mission began in January of 2007 when the 111th was recognized as one of three units in the country to receive EMEDS. The other two Air National Guard units reside at Forbes Field, Kansas and Fairchild Air Force Base, Washington.

How did this EMEDS concept evolve for the Air National Guard?

Since September 11, 2001, when our country came under simultaneous terrorist attacks, there has been a strong focus on homeland security response resources if (and when) future disasters occur. Simultaneously, the National Guard Bureau began their transformation from the Air Transportable Hospitals to the more transportable EMEDS concept.

What is the difference between an EMEDS, EMEDS+10 and EMEDS+25 package?

The simple answer is the number and types of beds available, equipment, and personnel needed to staff the facility. EMEDS is best described as a transportable hospital with limited surgical capabilities. The EMEDS+10 adds ten medical beds, dental capabilities, and additional resources such as an X-ray machine. The EMEDS+25 adds twenty-five beds, a more robust operating room and additional staffing. Personnel and supply packages are augmented to meet the specific requirements of each EMEDS level.

Medi-Our cal Group has one EMEDS+10 and two EMEDS+25. All three of these packages are deployable. tionally, one of our current EMEDS+25 packages is palletized and ready to deploy. We are in the midst of hurricane season and, thanks to tremendous support from the Wing, we have a unit ready to go if

needed. This EMEDS has the capability of supporting a community with a population of 3,000-5,000 people.

When would an EMEDS be deployed?

EMEDS would be deployed during a homeland disaster or an emergency where an existing hospital is destroyed, damaged, or overwhelmed with patients. The National Guard Bureau would normally determine which unit will send out its EMEDS package. For this hurricane season, which is Jun. 1 to Nov. 30, the 111th has been selected to be the first to respond.

Has an EMEDS ever been deployed?

Yes. The Kansas unit deployed their EMEDS+25 to support damaged civilian health care centers in Mississippi after Hurricane Katrina. Members of the 111th Medical Group were part of the personnel package that was activated in response to Katrina.

The Medical Group depends on the members and resources of the rest of the Wing to get an EMEDS package out the door. So you are also an integral part of this exciting new mission!

The Guardsmen, who had spent the last six months playing a critical role in the war on terror, were greeted by cheers, hugs and tears as they stepped off the buses. Major General Stephen Sischo, Deputy Adjutant General-Air,

Pennsylvania National Guard, attended the homecoming.

"These people are your friends and neighbors and they, and their families, deserve a tremendous amount of thanks for their sacrifices," expressed the general. Although the deployment was not in response to recent turmoil in Kyrgyzstan, the Airmen were placed on high alert.

Carrol Quinn, wife of Master Sgt. Patrick Quinn, 111th SFS, said, "I am so relieved. I lost my best friend

Chief encourages Guard participation in Don't Ask, Don't Tell survey

Soldiers and Airmen of the National Guard should share their views of the so-called "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" law by filling out a survey, the chief of the National Guard Bureau said today.

"Your inputs will be instrumental in shaping the implementation of any change to the law that may occur," said Air Force Gen. Craig R. McKinley.

On July 8, the Department of Defense emailed surveys to 400,000 servicemembers as part of a special review to prepare the military for a potential repeal of the law that bans gays and lesbians from openly serving. Half of the surveys went to active-duty servicemembers, and half went to reservists. For those who did not receive a survey via email, an online inbox is also available at www.defense.gov/dadt. A common access card is required to provide input.

The site is not confidential; however, directions from the site, as well as in the survey, are provided for members who wish to continue a "confidential dialogue" with non-DoD members of the working group.

Once servicemembers enter that confidential site, they will be given an untraceable PIN number they then can use to log on from any computer.

The working group's final report is due to Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates by Dec. 1.
