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Base beaver finds a new home

This past August brought about the discovery of a beaver trying to make a permanent home of the water run-off containment area located near the fuel storage tanks on base. His choice of building his dam by the outflow valve meant he had to go.

Adam Jacobs and Zachary Bair, employees with the USDA, prepare to release our resident beaver to his new home. The relocation effort took only two hours to complete.

Two wildlife technicians from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) were called in to make a health assessment on the animal and relocate the beaver to a safe and isolated waterway nearby. Zachary Bair with the USDA identified the beaver as a male, approximately one year old and exhausted from rebuilding his den several times. "Be it good or bad, beavers are wildlife environment makers. They create wetlands for plant life, fish and aquatic birds," Bair said.

The beaver was captured and quickly caged by the wildlife team. A truck ride to his new remote home happened immediately after. Opening the cage door at the pond water's edge, the animal slowly emerged, glanced around, then headed straight off into the water. A follow-up visit one week later found the beaver well fed and enjoying his afternoon swim ending with a tail slap.

When asked, Bair and his assistant Adam Jacobs could neither confirm nor deny if the beaver was in any way related to a Ward, Joan or Wally Cleaver.

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TRICARE Reserve Select health insurance both accessible and affordable

Given this tough economy, it is likely that some guardsmen have lost their civilian jobs or have had to take a job with reduced or no health insurance coverage. If you have tried to get medical coverage on your own, you have probably encountered high costs, high deductibles and limited benefits, especially if you have pre-existing conditions.

The good news is there is accessible and affordable health insurance available to military reservists and guard members. It is called TRICARE Reserve Select (TRS). TRICARE is the US medical benefit plan which covers uniformed personnel, retirees, dependents, reservists and guardsmen.

For example, a Guardsman with a family can expect to pay only \$198 per month for coverage under TRS. A similar, civilian insurance plan bought individually for a family could cost over \$1,600 a month. The average cost of an emergency room visit in 2008 was \$1,265 so it makes sense to take advantage of this opportunity!

MORE ABOUT TRICARE RESERVE SELECT:

- The plan can be purchased anytime throughout the year.
- The personal deductible is \$150 per person or \$300 for family but no deductible within the network.
 - Referrals are identified in TRS booklet.
 - No referrals generally needed for specialists in network.
 - You do not need a referral for any type of care, but some services may require prior authorization
 - Care at military treatment facilities is on a space-available basis only.

RED HORSE assists State Capitol region in flood clean-up

The 201st RED HORSE, Det. 1 activated 44 members on September 12th to assist state and local authorities with clean-up efforts after the onslaught of devastating rains brought on by Hurricane Irene and remnants of Tropical Storm Lee. The series of storms substantially impacted the central region of Pennsylvania.

Staged for a predawn convoy departure, personnel and 15 specialized trucks towed trailers loaded with earth moving equipment that lined the roadway. "Many of us worked late into the night finalizing all the staging necessary for the planned five o'clock departure," said Technical Sgt. Geoffrey Gay, heavy

equipment repairman with the 201st RED HORSE Squadron, Det. 1.

The Harrisburg region experienced record-breaking rainfalls of over 22 inches from Aug. 1st through Sept. 10th. Annual average precipitation for this timeframe is a mere 4.25 inches compared to 13.47 inches of precipitation that came solely from the three days of tropical storm Lee.

The deployed members from Horsham Air Guard Station, named TASK FORCE ENGINEERING, joined Army guardsmen from TASK FORCE JOSHUA in northern Harrisburg. They were dispatched immediately to a sector of streets to assist in clean-up efforts. The teams hand carried mounds of water

damaged household goods that were now clogging walkways and roads. Heavy frontend loading equipment was used to fill large dump trucks, while the Harrisburg Police Department provided escort and road closure operations.

Neighborhood residents were extremely pleased to receive the assistance from the teams as they went from house to house. Varying degrees of home damage was reported, from minor wet walls to basement and first floor flooding from the swelling Susquehanna River. Children came out of their front doors and offered smiles, waves and thanks to the workers on the street.

Command and control of the Pennsylvania TASK FORCE SOUTH (PTF-S) region is typically a joint task divided between the Pa Army Guard, 56th Stryker Brigade and Pa Air Guard, 111th Fighter Wing. This past week, primary responsibility for this incident response had been transferred to the 111th Fighter Wing under Lt. Col. Joseph Mezzatesta, Commander of the 111th Mission Support Group. The PTF-S team is currently manned jointly with members of the 56th Stryker Brigade and 111th Fighter Wing around the clock. This area of coordination extends from Philadelphia County to west Bedford County and as far north as Penn State College main campus in Centre County.

The RED HORSE response mission came to an end on Friday Sept. 16 as they convoyed from Harrisburg back home to Willow Grove. According to Senior Master Sgt. Timothy Siffel, 201st RED HORSE Sq., Det. 1 deployed operation superintendent, the tonnage of refuse collected approached 100,000 pounds, with 50 full large dump truck loads collected on Wednesday alone.

The program teaches and re-enforces the skills and attitudes associated with successful marriages. Several of the areas covered in PREP course focused on: communication, conflict management, affect regulation, commitment, expectation, intimacy enhancement, and gender differences. It provides a proactive approach, geared towards relationship adjustments rather than reactionary intervention after problems have emerged.

Sections of the program were lead by 111th Fighter Wing chaplains, Lt. Col. Rhonda Cushman and Capt. John Caudle. Caudle said, "Pennsylvania has taken a lead role nationally in bringing this program to its Air Guard side as this is our second year of involvement. The Army Guard, nationally, has been involved for several years now."

Technical Sgt. Anthony Henderson, customer service representative with the 111th Force Support Squadron, was in attendance with his wife Katrina. "The facilities and service here at the hotel are phenomenal," Katrina said. "We were really looking forward to the getaway, time to spend with one another."

Anthony said, "We've been married a long time, but

never so long that we couldn't learn some new tips or hints to keep thing fresh and on track. The program is giving us possibilities of looking at things from a new perspective."

Air Force dress and personal appearance changes go into effect on Nov. 1

How many uniforms changes have you been through in your career? Do you think you could pass an Air Force Dress and Personal Appearance test if it was given? As a supervisor, do you know if your airmen are in compliance?

AFI 36-2903, Dress and Personal Appearance was recently released introducing the new uniform items, along with which items were being phased out. What's out: effective 1 Nov 2011 is the battled dress uniform, desert camouflage uniform and tan boots (excluding Airman deployed to the AOR), black t-shirt and black combat boots. Previous phase out items included: the 100 percent wool pullover sweater; 2EXXX, 3AXXX and 3CXXX legacy badges; green fleece used as outer garment with or without name, service designator and rank; black fleece; gray and dark blue scarves, gloves, mittens, and earmuff and 33S legacy badges.

If you are interested in perusing the 180 page instruction, it has a good facelift—it is rearranged so that you could review each uniform in its own section along with pictures. Personal male and female grooming standards covering requirements on fingernails, cosmetics, tattoo and body piercing is one entire chapter.

Did you know:

(1) Earrings: male airmen are not authorized to wear earrings on a military installation or while in uniform or in civilian attire for official duty; female

earrings should be round, white diamond, gold, white pearl or silver earrings. If a female has more than one hole, it will be worn in the lower earlobes.

(2) Bracelets: one bracelet around the wrist, no wider than ½ inch, gold or silver without inappropriate pictures or writing. Bracelets espousing support for cause, philosophy and individual groups are NOT authorized (exception: traditional metal POW/MIA/KIA).

(3) Handheld Electronic Devices: holster or other storage devices to carry cell phones, MP3, Bluetooth, etc. should be black, silver, dark blue or gray; wear/use of earpiece while in uniform indoors or outdoors is prohibited unless for official duties.

(4) Hair: Should be clean, well-groomed and natural human hair colors; Male-sideburns straight and even width; beards are not authorized unless with shaving waiver; mustaches not extend downward beyond the lip line of upper lip. Woman-no rooster tail appearance; scrunches or ornaments not authorized; no fad-dish styles.

(5) Eyeglasses/Sunglasses- conservative and not worn on top/back of head.

The list goes on and on. The five elements for dress and personal appearance is neatness, cleanliness, safety, uniformity and military image. The extreme, the unusual and the fad is NOT compatible with a disciplined and committed Airman. As you walk in front of a mirror, check yourself out. Can you pass the AFI 36-2903 test?
